Improving student achievement

Heartland Area Education Agency has been helping children reach their potential since 1975. The agency works in partnership with public and accredited nonpublic schools to provide educational services, programs and resources for improving student achievement.

The more than 870* Heartland AEA staff members serve preschool children, K-12 students, families, educators and sometimes entire communities.

Partners in Education

Full AEA Accreditation. Heartland AEA was fully accredited in 2005 by the State Board of Education. Accreditation is the result of AEA 11’s continuous improvement process to better serve Dallas Center-Grimes CSD and other districts. Accreditation helps AEAs improve the quality and focus of their services in order to assist schools and districts to improve student learning.

Support for Diverse Learners. Heartland AEA provides many services to six diverse learner populations:

- Early Access (birth to age 3)
- Special Education
- Gifted and Talented
- Section 504
- English Language Learners
- Youth At-Risk

Heartland staff support and assist Dallas Center-Grimes to identify diverse learners through screening and assessments, create an equitable learning environment for these youth and evaluate their outcomes.

Internet Savings. Dallas Center-Grimes participates in aggregate Internet service through Heartland to the Internet service provider, the ICN. This service saved the district about \$6,840 last year. Heartland also provides a free district Internet filter.

Focus on High Schools. Heartland is assisting Area 11 educators to enhance the quality and effectiveness of high school education. The agency is sponsoring learning and sharing opportunities for high school leadership teams to support Iowa’s initiative to strengthen its high schools.

Big Books. Big Books are oversized books for children. The enlarged print and graphics capture students’ interest and help build a foundation for reading. Dallas Center-Grimes CSD purchased 253 Big Books from Heartland, which subsidized their cost and offered them for \$5 each.

Technology to Improve Learning Heartland AEA provides several technology programs including staff development, E2T2 middle school math initiative, student technology fair, listservs and consultations. Heartland helps Dallas Center-Grimes staff identify and implement technologies to improve teaching and learning.

Cooperative Purchasing. Dallas Center-Grimes CSD purchased paper and school supplies totaling \$33,421 through Heartland's Cooperative Services program. Cooperative purchasing saves money for school districts on a variety of classroom, office and maintenance products.

School Improvement. School improvement focuses on programs for school and community planning to increase student achievement. School improvement consultants work closely with school staff to plan and provide professional development activities to improve skills leading to better teaching and learning.

Better Hearing. Heartland staff members annually screen the hearing of every DC-G elementary student and do follow-up evaluations when needed.

Assessment Services. AEA 11's Assessment Services staff provide Dallas Center-Grimes educators support for collecting, analyzing and using classroom, school and district data. Assessment Services provides test and survey development, a scanning center for custom-made bubble sheet tests, the HEART program to generate data graphs and much more.

Curriculum and Instruction. AEA curriculum consultants provide resources and capacity building for school and district staff in reading, math and science. Consultants also support teacher and administrator leadership.

Student, Teacher Resources 24/7. Iowa AEA Online (www.iowaaeaonline.org) features educational resources funded and provided by Iowa's AEAs. Resources such as World Book Online and ClipArt.com are accessible from school or home 24 hours a day. Iowa AEA Online supports the content standards for school curriculum and student learning by bringing a wealth of information to teachers and students. Contact Heartland for a password.

Project SEMI. Dallas Center-Grimes CSD is among the districts with at least one teacher training to use Heartland's Project SEMI with students. SEMI (Science Education Mobile Instruction) is Iowa's only mobile life sciences lab, a 53-foot semitrailer that brings cutting-edge biotechnology equipment, materials and curriculum to schools.

Connecting Parents, Educators. Heartland's Parent-Educator Connection links Dallas Center-Grimes educators and parents of children with significant special needs. PEC staff, themselves parents of individuals with special needs, provide services that link teachers and parents for the benefit of the student.

Intro to AEA. Dallas Center-Grimes staff participated in Heartland's new teacher open house in 2004 and 2005 to learn about the services, materials and technology available at the AEA to help them become better educators.
